Getting on for two decades ago, reports hit the press that Prince Charles had had a major row with his brother Prince Edward over some filming made at St. Andrews University where Prince William was a student. Prince Charles was said to be "incandescent" with rage! At the time this was all blowing up, a friend of mine who I trust completely, happened to have stayed overnight with the Royal Family. This friend witnessed the two princes embracing, kissing and being completely at one with each other – thus completely discrediting the reports in the press.

It has often occurred to me that we only know public figures – whether they be television, film or theatre celebrities, or politicians, through what we read or hear about them through the media. I think we are often given an artificial picture of what someone is really like.

On Saturday 15th February we learned that the very well known and loved television personality Caroline Flack had taken her own life. This news created shockwaves across the country and there are calls for TV, press and social media to be held to account. I remember Caroline as an absolutely outstanding competitor on Strictly Come Dancing – she came across then as a very hardworking and gifted dancer with a very engaging personality. It is devastating to thing that she was a victim of the fame and success that eventually led to her being vilified by parts of the press and some members of the public via social media.

We ask "why can't the tabloids be brought under control?" And we have to resist such pleas with the danger of losing the right to free speech which is such a vital cornerstone of our democracy. However, we all have a choice as to what papers we read and how much we get caught up in opinions expressed via social media.
